The Ecumenical Youth Gathering in Karlsruhe

The Ecumenical Youth Gathering was held August 27-30, 2022 as one of the pre-assemblies in preparation for the 11th WCC Assembly. It brought together young people from WCC member churches and ecumenical partners to provide a youth-focused open space for worship, dialogue and consultation.

With the intent to build solidarity among young people around the world, the Ecumenical Youth Gathering convened under the theme "Christ's love reconciles and restores young people in the church and the society."

The Global Christian Forum had the opportunity to support eight young people to participate in the EYG. Three of the delegates kindly share their reflections with us.

Reflection from Berto Kado

The Diversity of Worship shocked me! I have learned how different people groups express their reverence to God and that sometimes it's in ways that challenge my traditional ideas of what worship should look like. It's so beautiful how God called different people to serve alongside Him and never expects the execution to be in the same manner. This is what I want to share and impart to everyone I know. That it's okay to be different, God loves our uniqueness and calls us to 'perform' only for an audience of one.

Reflection from Rev. Stacey Duensing Pearce

Participating in the Ecumenical Youth Gathering (EYG) of the World Council of Churches is an experience I will treasure for a lifetime. In the two years leading up to the gathering I worked with a "Design Team" of 20 other young people to plan and implement the event, serving this team specifically on behalf of the Global Christian Forum. My role on this team was to work with a committee for "Spiritual Life" who planned all moments of bible study and prayer for the Ecumenical Youth Gathering. Perhaps you can imagine my joy during the first prayer service of EYG; to finally see gathered almost 400 young people from all over the world to pray to and praise God. In my context of the North American Church, 20–30 year-old's are often the missing demographic from local churches. To suddenly be gathered with a diverse and dynamic group of these young spiritual leaders was a gift that left me feeling intellectually stimulated, spiritually filled, and significantly supported by the fellowship and friendship I found there.

Each day of the Ecumenical Youth Gathering had a different theme: Celebrating Gifts, Visiting Wounds, Transforming Injustice, and Closing Celebration. In planning for the event, I anticipated the day with the most energy would be "Transforming Injustice". After all, young leaders are often some of the most passionate seekers of justice in a world in need of God's transformation. What surprised me, however, was the need for "Visiting Wounds" at our gathering. During bible study on the second day, Jooeun Kim of the Presbyterian Church in South Korea led a prayer of lament based on Psalm 42. In between dramatic readings of the psalm and singing, Jooeun asked EYG participants to write on a piece of paper a wound they have experienced in their own lives or in the world. Everyone was then invited to place their written wound in a basket and to take a different person's written wound and pray for them. The moment was powerful. Sobs could be heard as people held each other's wounds in their hands and prayed for the wounds of the church. At the end of our time of prayer, a participant approached me and said this: "We came to this place as strangers. We leave today as a community". This powerful experience from the Ecumenical Youth Gathering continues to make me to ponder: How can holding one another's wounds before God and praying for one another in our diversity of need lead to greater Christian Unity? This prayer of 'Visiting Wounds' shaped the whole experience of the Ecumenical Youth Gathering. If you read the official message from the Ecumenical Youth Gathering, you will notice it begins with lament for the brokenness and pain in the world. Only after naming these wounds do the young people from EYG then call upon the church into action for seeking justice and peace with the guidance of God.
